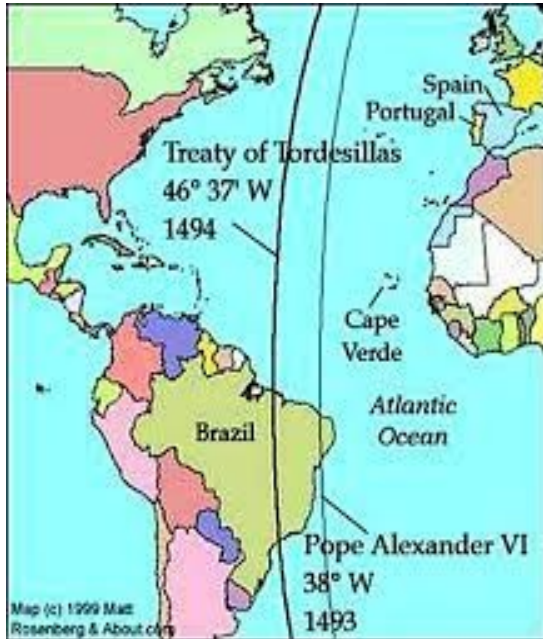


## Treaty of Tordesillas: Dividing the New World among Spain, Portugal, and Brazil
